Common Course Outline CONT 246 Construction Claims and Changes 3 Credits

Description

CONT 246 - Construction Claims and Changes includes the study of procedures for administration and processing of contract claims and changes; and traces claims and change orders from initiation in the field to final resolution.

3 credits

Prerequisite: CSIT101 and CONT 136 or permission of the Construction Management Coordinator

Overall Course Objectives

Upon completion of this course students will be able to:

- 1. identify types of claims and the cost elements related to each;
- 2. create a daily log, which captures daily progress of the job;
- 3. prepare daily logs and RFI's using events on an actual project;
- 4. examine the use of CPM scheduling in assessing job progress;
- 5. create an as planned as built CPM schedule;
- 6. calculate field and home office overhead;
- 7. identify areas of potential claims;
- 8. list items to be discussed at pre-construction and progress meetings;
- 9. create and organize job records to substantiate a claim;
- 10. review and negotiate a subcontract agreement;
- 11. negotiate claims handouts; and
- 12. prepare and present a claim in a mock arbitration

- II. Record keeping
- III. Cost components
- IV. Discrete pricing
- V. Overhead
- VI. Preparing, defending, and presenting claims
- VII. Dispute resolution

Course Requirements
