# **Description**

HIST 111 – 3 credits – History of the United States I examines American History (Colonial period through the American Civil War) from several different perspectives and analyzes several themes including race, class, ethnicity, gender, and nationalism. An in-depth analysis of selected issues, periods, personalities or institutions is completed in an effort to understand the youthful nation's changing, often clashing, attitudes and values.

#### **Course Objectives**

Upon successful completion of this course students will be able to:

- 1. examine a variety of primary and secondary sources of historical information, which may include scholarly books and articles, websites and blogs, historical documentaries, biographies, diaries, letters, newspapers, novels and statistical reports;
- 2. identify the major concepts, events and issues that shaped the history of the US and defined its place in the global community up to 1865;
- 3. construct an historical argument that is based on the logical presentation of specific historical facts and that analyzes the causal factors of a historical event or process.
- 4. explain the convergence of individuals, ideas, social institutions, technology, economics and social structure in the shaping of US foreign and domestic policy to 1865;
- 5. determine the role that religion, race, class, gender, and ethnicity play in influencing US domestic and foreign policy to 1865;
- 6. evaluate interpretive works written by historians for bias and accuracy;
- 7. find, evaluate, use and cite academic resources that assess historical research;
- 8. explain the causal factors that influence a historical event or process;
- 9. interpret historical data in chart or graph formats;
- 10. compare and contrast significant geopolitical relationships through the use of maps;
- 11. analyze the significance of historical events to the evolution of American ideas, social structure, economic policies, and foreign affairs, and
- 12. assess the ethical roles and value of online resources in historical research and analysis.

# **Course Requirements**

<u>Grading/exams</u>: Grading procedures will be determined by the individual faculty member, but will include the following:

- a minimum of 3 reading assignments, normally consisting of 450 pages or more.
- a minimum of 3 exams and 3 quizzes consisting of a combination of objective and critical thinking/analysis components.
- at least one individual or group oral presentation of relevant materials.

<u>Written Assignments:</u> Multiple assignments (a minimum of 600 words, written in class and 1500 words, out of class) will infuse CCBC General Education Program objectives; at least one assignment worth a minimum of 10% of the total course grade will allow students to demonstrate at least 5 of the 7 General Education Program outcomes.

Attendance is a critical part of this course and active participation is expected of all students.

Students are required to utilize appropriate academic resources.
