Description

HUSC 224 – Delivery of Addiction Services: In this course, students explore the theories and practical skills necessary for the delivery of addiction treatment services, including the Stages of Change, screening, assessment, treatment planning, and discharge planning.

Pre-requisites: HUSC 139 and HUSC 142

Overall Course Objectives

Upon completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 1. apply the foundational skills of addiction treatment delivery to various case scenarios;
- 2. differentiate between screening and assessment, and apply each skill in appropriate situations;
- 3. apply the Stages of Change theory in screening, assessment, and treatment planning;
- 4. explain the guidelines and principles of client triage into clinically-appropriate treatment interventions, including appropriate referrals;
- 5. apply relevant Substance Use Disorder criteria from the Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Mental Disorders to various case scenarios;
- 6. recognize the signs and symptoms of co-occurring mental disorders and understand their role in treatment delivery;
- 7. differentiate client presentations within appropriate levels of care using American Society of Addiction Medicine (ASAM) patient placement criteria;
- 8. complete a clinical assessment interview; and
- 9. apply appropriate ethical and objective standards for documenting client data in the clinical record.

Course Requirements
