Professional Concepts in Massage Therapy 2 Credits

Description

MASS 240 – Professional Concepts in Massage Therapy examines the ethical and professional standards that govern scopes of practice as massage professionals in a variety of settings to prepare for employment after graduation. Students evaluate and triangulate professional employment options and liabilities, business models, codes of ethics, national standards of practice, and state mandated scopes of practice in real world application. Students also review continuing education requirements and the importance of professional membership organizations and their advocacy for the profession. Content outlines are reviewed in preparation for the national and state licensure exams to successfully obtain license to practice upon graduation.

2 Credits

Prerequisite: Successful completion of MASS 220 and MASS 222 with a grade of "C" or better, or permission of the Program Director.

Corequisite: MASS 272

Overall Course Objectives

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 1. create their own career mission statements by constructing their goals and objectives on becoming professional massage therapists;
- 2. evaluate proper ethical standards to professional practice applicable to a variety of practice settings;
- 3. identify professional organizations in massage therapy and their purposes to the profession;
- 4. design and develop marketing techniques to advocate and educate about the massage therapy profession as an individual and the community at large;
- 5. develop professional networking skills to create relationships with peers, health care professionals, and other related businesses;
- 6. select appropriate insurance coverage for scopes of practice and professional liability;
- 7. prepare a professional resume and develop interviewing skills in preparation for employment;

- 8. identify and select viable resource options for acquiring advanced certifications, training, and other continuing education to maintain a current license to practice; and
- 9. successfully pass the national Massage and Bodywork Licensure Examination (MBLEx), state jurisprudence examination, and/or equivalent upon graduation.
