# MUSC 211 Ear Training III

## **Description**

**MUSC 211 – Ear Training III:** Continues advanced training in "hearing" and "performing" the various components of music, including rhythm, pitch, intervals, chords, and melodies.

# Pre-requisites: Grade of "C" or better in MUSC 112 or qualifying exam Co-requisites: Remove if empty

#### **Overall Course Objectives**

Upon completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 1. Play and sing major and minor scales in keys with up to six accidentals;
- 2. Perform rhythms using the either and half notes as the pulse note (including duplets, triplets, and syncopation);
- 3. Write simple and compound rhythms using eight notes and half notes as the pulse (including triplets, duplets, and syncopation) presented via dictation;
- 4. Sing a melody while playing an accompaniment on the piano using accidents;
- 5. Play harmonic progressions using N6 and A6 chords;
- 6. Play harmonic progressions using various types of modulation;
- 7. Demonstrate an ability to sing at sight: chromatic melodies in keys with up to five accidentals, in both simple and compound meters;
- 8. Write chromatic melodies presented via dictation;
- 9. Write two-part diatonic pieces presented via dictation;
- 10. Recognize by sound melodic intervals (ascending and descending) and harmonic intervals (intervals played simultaneously);
- 11. Recognize by sound the four different types of triads;
- 12. Recognize by sound major and minor triads in first and second inversions;
- 13. Demonstrate an ability to read and perform music written in the alto clef; and
- 14. Demonstrate an ability to read and play figured bass.

## Major Topics

- I. Rhythm Sing and dictation
- II. Melody Sing and dictation
- III. Intervals Sing and dictation
- IV. Integration of piano into sight singing activities

#### **Course Requirements**
