Overall Course Description:

Educational Psychology

Presents applications of modern psychological research and principles to educational theory and practice. Course topics include: aspects of human development, theories of learning and instruction, creating positive learning environments, teaching for learning, assessment and grading, learner differences, motivation, and the impact of culture and community. The course is designed primarily for pre-service teachers or others interested in the educational process. NOTE: Same as PSYC 215. Credit earned for one only. Prerequisite: PSYC 101

Understand and describe the components of the behavioral and cognitive approaches to learning Compare and contrast these approaches

Identify behavioral strategies related to classroom management

Create motivators appropriate for specific ages and situations

Describe learning outcomes related to learning style and learning differences

Identify resources related to multicultural education

Identify components of valid classroom assessment

List the components of a lesson plan

Write appropriate behavioral objectives, using Bloom's taxonomy
