Description

SOCL 125 – American Society: addresses the special perspectives and problems most relevant to the rapidly changing nature of American society; explores social inequality: the causes and consequences of social stratification; sociology of law: power and morality; and the changing nature of American values: youth culture; drug cultures, and contemporary lifestyles.

Pre-requisites: ACLT 052 or ACLT 053

- 1. explain the special nature of the study of American society relative to general sociology;
- 2. identify the major problems and issues of contemporary American society;
- 3. explain the major theoretical orientations used in studying American society;
- 4. describe the application of major theoretical orientations in analyzing the problems and issues of American society;
- 5. describe the methods used in sociological research:
- 6. discuss how to utilize these methods in data gathering and analysis about American society:
- 7. analyze how power is utilized through the law in effecting the nature of basic institutions in American society:
- 8. describe the causes and effects of changing social values in American society;
- 9. discuss how change is an integral part of the American experience; and
- 10. discuss subcultures within American society including youth cultures, drug cultures, and contemporary lifestyles' cultures.
