Introduction to Women's Studies 3 Credits

Description

WMST 101 – 3 credits –Introduction to Women's Studies is an interdisciplinary introduction to the status, achievements, and experiences of women in society. Past and current theories of gender, power, and equity are analyzed. Women's experiences in societal institutions such as the arts, education, the labor force, law and politics, marriage and family life, and religion are critically examined. A multicultural approach is taken to present the contributions of underrepresented groups of women. Students are expected to attend one co-curricular activity.

Overall Course Objectives

Upon successful completion of this course the student will be able to:

- 1. define feminism, gender socialization, and other theoretical concepts related to the study of gender;
- 2. analyze the nature and effects of gender and how they intersect with other social hierarchies in modern American society;
- 3. discuss the issues related to social, political and economic forces that shape the sexual division of labor;
- 4. identify key historical and cultural world events in women's struggle for equality;
- 5. compare and contrast gender roles of men and women worldwide;
- 6. summarize the social, political, economic, and intellectual contributions that culturally diverse and under-represented populations have made;
- 7. discuss social, economic, and workforce public policy issues that affect gender;
- 8. explain one's personal assumptions about gender relations in a variety of cultures, classes, races, and sexual orientations;
- 9. research ethical issues related to gender equity among culturally diverse populations;
- 10. evaluate the impact that digital, print, and social-media technology has in the shaping of gender relations;
- 11. use popular technologies to research gender equity;
- 12. find, evaluate, use and cite academic resources to analyze and examine gender issues, and
- 13. interpret global statistics related to gender inequities.

Course Requirements
