Common Course Outline DNHY 212

General and Oral Pathology 2 Semester Hours

Description

DNHY 212 – 2 Credits – General and Oral Pathology focuses on the fundamentals of general pathology, the disease process and oral pathology with emphasis on the recognition and identification of pathogenic conditions that most frequently occur with oral and surrounding structures.

2 Credits; 2 lecture hours per week

Co-requisites: DNHY 210, DNHY 211, and DNHY 213

Overall Course Objectives

Upon completion of this course, the dental hygiene student will be able to:

- 1. discuss the etiology, progression, recognition, and treatment of pathological conditions affecting the oral cavity;
- 2. recognize the clinical and/or radiographic manifestations of pathological conditions affecting the oral cavity;
- 3. discuss the histological appearance of specific pathological entities;
- 4. describe the normal structure and function and the variations of the structure that are within normal anatomical and functional limits;
- 5. using appropriate terminology, describe the clinical appearance of lesions within soft tissue to include size, color, consistency, surface texture, and radiographic terms:
- 6. differentiate common oral lesions;
- 7. discuss oral manifestations of prevalent chronic health conditions that require knowledge and skills in oral medicine;
- 8. conduct clear and tactful discussion of clinical manifestations of disease with the client, the dentist or other health professionals; and
- 9. determine whether a referral of definitive diagnosis is needed.
