Description

DNHY 220 – 1 Credit- Dental Hygiene Theory IV introduces the students to a study of

professional ethics and dental jurisprudence, professional organizations, and issues

involving the dental hygiene profession. Students learn the laws and rules governing the

practice of dental hygiene in the state of Maryland. Practice management skills and

employment preparation, including resumes and interview techniques, are reviewed.

1 credit; 1 lecture hours per week

Prerequisite: Successful completion of DNHY 210, DNHY 211, DNHY 212, and

DNHY 213

Co-requisites: DNHY 221 and DNHY 222

Overall Course Objectives

Upon completion of this course, the dental hygiene student will be able to:

1. summarize the issues emphasized in the American Dental Hygienists' Association (ADHA) Code of Ethics;

2. differentiate between laws and ethics;

3. state the general characteristics and purposes of practice acts;

4. discuss the standards of care, protection against liability, and benefits of malpractice insurance;

5. complete applications for licensure examinations;

6. write an employment cover letter and resume; and

7. develop a career plan that ranges from one to five years after graduation.
