Description

Management 115 – Seminar in Supervisory Problems: is a course in which students will analyze and solve specific types of technical and personnel problems encountered primarily by front-line supervisors. Students will use a case study/problem approach in addressing supervisory problems.

Overall Course Objectives

- 1. identify the steps in the 7-step problem solving technique;
- 2. apply the steps in the 7-step problem solving technique;
- 3. develop a statement of problem;
- 4. analyze case studies for decision making;
- 5. construct solutions to supervisory problems;
- 6. examine ethics in dealing with supervisory decisions;
- 7. identify the laws impacting supervisory actions and decisions;
- 8. discuss the significance of diversity in solving supervisory problems;
- 9. explain the importance of technology in addressing supervisory problems;
- 10. address the current status of drug use in the workplace;
- 11. identify currently accepted supervisory principles in solving problems; and
- 12. apply currently accepted supervisory principles in solving problems.
