Description

Medical Terminology

Studies the language of medicine including word construction, definitions, and use of words related to medical science in general; emphasizes the interpretation and translation of medical records and documents.

Prerequisite: ACLT 052 or ACLT 053

Overall Course Objectives

Upon successful completion of the course, the student will be able to:

- 1. Use appropriate prefixes, suffixes and root words to convert lay language into medical terms.
- 2. Interpret medical documents and translate those documents into the vernacular.
- 3. Given a document in the vernacular, convert the document into medical terminology.
- 4. Describe the various medical professionals.
- 5. Convert the common names of body anatomy to medical terms and vice versa.
- 6. Proper use medical abbreviations to shorten the length of medical documents.
- 7. Identify laboratory tests used in determining the cause or identifying a variety of most common diseases.

Major Topics

- 1. Construction of medical terms
- 2. Rules and use of the language of medicine
- 3. Naming body parts and anatomical positions
- 4. Body organization and body cavities
- 5. Usage of medical abbreviations
- 6. Medical professionals and the team approach to patient care
- 7. Documents and forms used in patient charts
- 8. Systems approach to medical terminology
 - a. Cardiovasculr
 - b. Respiratory
 - c. Digestive
 - d. Musculoskeletal
 - e. Endocrine
 - f. Nervous
 - g. Excretory
 - h. Reproductive

Course Requirements

Specific assignments and procedures for evaluating student performance in this course will be described in the individual class syllabus, but will include the following:

- 1. Attendance and active participation in all class activities, collaborative work and discussion
- 2. Minimum of two exams including objective testing, spelling items and word construction
- 3. Periodic quizzes
- 4. A two to five page written paper demonstrating the use and understanding of medical terms
