Description

MCOM/ENGL 151 – Introduction to Journalism introduces the skills, principles, and ethics of reporting. Students learn different styles of journalistic writing (feature, editorial, and news) as well as researching and interview skills.

Overall Course Objectives

Upon completion of this course, students will be able to:

1. distinguish between news, feature and opinion writing;
2. identify biased writing;
3. generate story ideas;
4. write effective news leads using Associated Press (AP) Style;
5. write effective news and feature stories using AP Style;
6. write effective commentaries using AP Style;
7. practice journalistic ethics;
8. apply libel and slander law and avoid those legal problems;
9. demonstrate the ability to meet deadlines;
10. prepare for and conduct effective interviews;
11. accurately report information from interviews; and
12. use quotes and attribution effectively.

Course Requirements

- A minimum of one editorial/commentary (500 words Minimum)
- One interview assignment
- Two examinations or four small assignments/quizzes
