Description

CRJU 120 – Criminal Law: provides students with an introduction to the study of criminal law. Included topics related to sources of criminal law, elements of a criminal act (crime), mental state required, defenses, and certain specific crimes against persons, crimes against property, crimes against public order, and crimes against the State.

Pre-requisites: CRJU 101

Overall Course Objectives

Upon completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 1. recognize the differences between criminal law and civil law;
- 2. describe essential elements of various crimes;
- 3. describe essential elements specific to inchoate crimes;
- 4. determine the legal requirements for charging an individual with a particular crime;
- 5. illustrate the components necessary for a successful prosecution of a criminal case;
- 6. recognize the sources of criminal law, including: common law, constitutional law, case law, and statutory law;
- 7. differentiate substantive criminal law and criminal procedure;
- 8. identify various parties to a crime;
- 9. analyze criminal defenses; and
- 10. appraise society's policies on punishment.

Course Requirements

Grading will be determined by the individual faculty member, but shall include the following, at minimum:

- three writing assignments to include at least 2 of the following
 - written analysis of criminal law scenarios in which the student identifies the specific statute violated and the elements of the particular crime committed.
 - · evaluation of media accounts of crimes committed
 - drafting a case brief related to a criminal law focused court opinion (state or federal).

Written assignments and research projects: Students are required to use appropriate academic resources in their research and cite sources according to the style selected by their professor.
