Description

CRJU 258 – 3 credits - Social Justice in the Urban Community examines agencies and processes involved in criminal justice in the urban community. It also examines the role of the media in problem creation and problem resolution in the urban community and discusses continuing dynamics and the effects of discrimination and prejudice.

Overall Course Objectives

Upon completion of this course the students will be able to:

1. explain what social justice is and analyze its role in the criminal justice process;
2. explain social justice in relation to a variety of urban social problems;
3. explain how the law can contribute to attaining social justice;
4. describe the Criminal Justice System and its components in relation to other social institutions;
5. analyze criminal justice system practices that employ social exclusion and social justice; and
6. explain the impact media has on criminal justice practices in the urban setting.
