DANC 147 History of Hip Hop Dance

Description

DANC 147 – History of Hip Hop Dance: is a course in which students trace the evolution of dance in Hip Hop culture from its foundations in Africa to its current transformation as a multicultural phenomenon impacting dance, music, literature, and popular culture. Attending a Dance Concert performance is required, and admission fees may be charged.

Overall Course Objectives

Upon completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 1. describe African and African American cultures as they influence Hip Hop dance;
- 2. analyze the social and political conditions during slavery, the Harlem Renaissance and the Civil Rights movement as influences on the development of Hip Hop dance;
- 3. describe the contributions of Hip Hop creators on dance in both American and international cultures;
- 4. analyze the role of gender, gender identity, and gender stereotypes in Hip Hop dance;
- 5. explain the historic and ongoing role of technology on Hip Hop dance;
- 6. analyze the different styles of Hip Hop dance artists;
- 7. identify appropriate criteria for making aesthetic judgments about dance;
- 8. create projects using effective oral, written, visual and/or performance skills;
- 9. discuss the ethical issues, such as copyright, in Hip Hop dance;
- 10. utilize technology to prepare and present projects that includes text, images, and video
- 11. find, evaluate, use, and cite appropriate research sources for dance; and
- 12. compare different dance forms using effective written communication skills.

 - b. Roles of gender, gender identity, and gender stereotyping in Hip Hop Dance
 - c. Career opportunities

Course Requirements

Grading will be determined by the individual faculty member, but shall include the following, at minimum:

- active participation in class discussions and movement sessions
- two written examinations
- two writing assignments

- one creative project
- CCBC Dance Concert attendance

Written assignments and research projects: Students are required to use appropriate academic resources in their research and cite sources according to the style selected by their professor.

Other Course Information

One or more assignments will infuse CCBC General Education Program outcomes and will account for a minimum of 10% of the total course grade. The assignment(s) will allow students to demonstrate at least 5 of the 7 General Education program outcomes. This course is approved as a General Education Diversity course.
