HIST 116 African American History

3 Credits

Description

HIST 116 – African American History: examines the origin of African American people in continental Africa and traces the Black experience in America to the present. An emphasis is placed upon African roots, transition to enslavement, the realities of enslavement, opposition to enslavement, the Civil War, Reconstruction and its aftermath, the period of the Nadir, Black Nationalism, African American participation in the World Wars, institutional development, and the modern Civil Rights Movement.

Co-requisites: ACLT 053 or (ESOL 052 and ESOL 054)

Overall Course Objectives

Upon completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 1. analyze contemporary American society as it relates to the African American past;
- 2. identify the relevant antecedent events and ideologies that have shaped current public issues such as discrimination, prejudice and ethical decision-making;
- 3. explain the contributions African Americans have made to American society;
- 4. analyze historical information related to African American life, history, or culture using primary and secondary sources such as diaries, speeches, newspapers, biographies, electronic sources, and interpretive essays;
- 5. synthesize information, from both print and electronic sources, to construct a historical argument that is based on the ethical and logical presentation of specific historical facts:
- 6. compare and contrast the experiences of African Americans of different national origins, genders, classes, and ideologies;
- 7. identify connections between African Americans and the African Diaspora:
- 8. find, evaluate, use and cite academic resources that relate to the diverse historical environments covered throughout the course;
- 9. determine the role that race, class, gender, religion, and ethnicity play in influencing historical issues and events;
- 10. develop skills in listening and conflict resolution in order to apply these skills to cross-cultural dialogue;
- 11.interpret data, in chart or graph formats, that analyzes the causal factors of historical events or processes in African American history; and
- 12. identify the value and role of online resources in historical research on African American life, history, and culture.

- X. African Americans and the Great Depression; Black cultural movement 1930-1950

- XII. Emergence of the Civil Rights Movement 1940-1960
- XIII. Rise of militancy and Black nationalism
- XIV. Legislative gains of the Civil Rights movement
- XV. Contemporary Issues

Course Requirements

Grading will be determined by the individual faculty member, but shall include the following, at minimum:

- Two exams
- Two quizzes
- One individual or group oral presentation
- Multiple assignments (a minimum of 600 words written in class and 2000 words, out of class) will infuse CCBC General Education Program objectives; at least one assignment worth a minimum of 10% of the total course grade will allow students to demonstrate at least 5 of the 7 General Education Program outcomes.

Written assignments and research projects: Students are required to use appropriate academic resources in their research and cite sources according to the style selected by their professor.

This course is an approved 3-credit General Education course in the Social and Behavioral Sciences.

This course is approved for General Education Diversity and Global Education programs. One or more assignments will infuse CCBC General Education Program outcomes and will account for a minimum of 10% of the total course grade.
