#### **Description**

**TDML 101 – Introduction to Transportation, Distribution, and Logistics:** is a course in which students are provided with an overview and a history of the basic functions involved in the transportation, distribution, and logistics of maritime commerce, in addition to the various career opportunities within the field.

**Co-requisites:** ACLT 053 or (ESOL 052 and ESOL 054)

#### **Overall Course Objectives**

Upon completion of this course, students will be able to:

1. identify major components of transportation, distribution, and logistics operations, including modes of transportation;
2. recognize major historical events impacting freight transportation, distribution, and logistics operations, including modes of transportation, warehousing, and inventory management;
3. describe the origin and development of logistics and distribution methods;
4. examine logistics and distribution operations, including inventory management and distribution models;
5. identify political, social, economic, and environmental factors in Transportation, Distribution, and Logistics (TDL);
6. discuss current events impacting TDL including global ethics and cultural diversity;
7. recognize career pathways in the TDL industry; and
8. explore local transportation operations.
