Description

WMST 251 – Psychology of Women: Examines the unique psychological and social issues confronting women today; critiques past and present theories regarding women's social development, sexuality, intellectual capacities, and psychology; analyzes social and cultural stresses particularly affecting women; presents skills and strategies for promoting constructive change.

Pre-requisites: PSYC 101

Overall Course Objectives

Upon completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 1. Exhibit an understanding of the difference between sex and gender:
- 2. Analyze sex role expectancies; including etiology, and impact on present and future behavior;
- 3. Develop a historical perspective on women in psychology;
- 4. Demonstrate an understanding of both environmental and genetic contributions to sex role development;
- 5. Evaluate the use of experimentation to determine the validity of contrasting theoretical approaches;
- 6. Critically evaluate cultural aspects of sex role development;
- 7. Apply the knowledge they acquire to foster gender quality; and
- 8. Recognize the contributions of women to modern society.
