Common Course Outline MUSC 114 Music Theory II 3 Semester Hours

Description

Continues the practical application of musical notation. Students analyze and write melodies and four-part chorales using chromatics, secondary dominants, diminished seventh chords, and modulation.

Prerequisite: 'C' or better in MUSC 113, or qualifying exam.

Overall Course Objectives

Upon completion of this course students will be able to:

- 1. Analyze, write and harmonize chromatic melodies.
- 2. Analyze, write and perform secondary dominants and diminished seventh chords.
- 3. Analyze, write and perform non-dominant functioning triads.
- 4. Analyze and write four-part chorales using secondary and non-dominant triads.
- 5. Determine various types of modulation including common chord, secondary dominant, and enharmonic.
- 6. Demonstrate an ability to modulate from one key to another key.
- 7. Discuss harmonic and melodic characteristics of musical compositions that make use of secondary triads, non-dominant triads and modulation.

<u>Major Topics</u>

- 1. Write melodies with chromatic alterations.
- 2. Write four-part chorales using the Principles of Voice-Leading.
- 3. Secondary dominant and diminished seventh chords.
- 4. Non-dominant and diminished seventh chords.
- 5. Modulation.
 - a) Common Chord
 - b) Secondary dominants and seventh chords
 - c) Enharmonic
- 6. Analyze musical composition using secondary and non-dominant seventh chords and modulation.

Course Requirements

- 1. Regular and punctual class attendance and active participation in class
- 2. Completion of written assignments covering Major Topics 1-6.
- 3. Written evaluations of Major Topics 1-6.
- 4. Evaluation of student's ability to discuss some of the theoretical aspects of musical compositions.
- 5. Listening assignments of works being studied and analyzed.

Other Course Information This course may make use of a Music Lab and computer programs to assist student learning. This course is the second in a series of four music theory courses required of all Music Majors.
