Multicultural Psychology

Description

PSYC 105 – Multicultural Psychology: considers local and global diversity from a psychological perspective. Aspects of race, social class, sex, gender, ethnicity, immigration, sexual orientation, age, health, religion, ability, and family structure are examined. Psychological concepts and methods are applied to develop an understanding of the impact of such diversities on human relationships. Additional topics covered include stereotypes, prejudice and discrimination, political influence, privilege and oppression, and communication styles.

Co-requisites: ACLT 053 or (ESOL 052 and ESOL 054)

Overall Course Objectives

Upon completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 1. identify through real-world situations the fundamental theoretical perspectives, principles, concepts, vocabulary, and methodology for each of the major topics;
- 2. critique psychological research on global diversity topics,
- 3. find, evaluate, use, and cite appropriate resources for research in multicultural psychology and global diversity;
- 4. apply concepts in multicultural psychology to personal experiences in a culturally diverse society;
- 5. examine diversity issues in multicultural psychology in written, visual, or oral format;
- 6. explain the significance of local and global diversity factors and their influence on human relationships;
- 7. use technology to retrieve, review, discuss, and present information related to global diversity; and
- 8. examine how potential biases can produce ethical challenges for both individual and group learning in a culturally diverse society

Course Requirements

Written assignments and research projects: Students are required to use appropriate academic resources in their research and cite sources according to the style selected by their professor.

One or more assignments will infuse CCBC General Education Program outcomes and will account for a minimum of 10% of the total course grade. The assignment(s) will allow students to demonstrate General Education program outcomes.
