Description

VETT 107 – Veterinary Medical Technology: introduces the study of language in veterinary medicine. The course includes word construction, definitions, and use of words in the veterinary medical field. Focus is placed on understanding terminology as it relates to veterinary medical disease processes and translation into medical records, which are legal documents.

Pre-requisite(s): Acceptance into the Veterinary Technology program

Overall Course Objectives

Upon completion of this course, students will be able to:

1. use appropriate prefixes, suffixes, and root words to convert lay language into veterinary medical terms;
2. convert the common names of body anatomy of various species to veterinary medical terms;
3. use veterinary medical abbreviations to shorten the length of medical documents; and
4. recognize the terminology associated with veterinary disease processes.
